Halloween, All Saints Day, and All Souls Day- Linked Festivities unfolding the Power of the Spirit-World

This weekend Halloween is being celebrated in our neighbourhoods. "Halloween" means "holy evening" as in "Hallow"= Holy and 'een short for "evening." Halloween falls on 31st October - the evening before All Saints day.

What are the symbols we connect to Halloween? We find pumpkins with saw-tooth grins, masks, tricks and treats. But what do all these symbols mean? Is Halloween just about American commercialism? Well, we can actually uncover a lot of religious truth in it.

Halloween comes from the old Celtic pagan celebrations held at the end of summer. As summer wanes and the days get shorter and the winter nights get longer, it gives the goblins and ghouls more dark time to work their mischief. To keep the evil spirits away, the pagans offered them treats-lollies and sweets so the evil spirits wouldn't play tricks on them. The clever Celtic pagans used to put on masks to disguise themselves as evil spirits so that they could fool the real spirits into leaving them alone. But these clever pagans- because they had evil masks on- could pose as evil spirits and they would steal the treats that had been left out for the evil spirits. That's where we get the "trick or treat" tradition.

It was this kind of pagan thing that the Christians met when they arrived in Ireland in the 4th century. Christians didn't do away with Halloween altogether, but, rather, they Christianised it i.e. they sifted out what was true and got rid of the superstitions. After all, the Christians figured, *there IS a spirit world*-the angels and saints in heaven-so this was a good opportunity to draw these pagans into remembering all the spirits, but that these spirits are kindly, friendly, members of the mystical Body, the communion of saints, as all of God's people, both living and dead, now united with us in God's love. So, the pagan custom of *appeasing* the spirits became the Christian holy time of *remembering* them. By *re*-membering all the dead that is exactly what we do...we re-connect and re-join all the living with all the dead....we become one vast holy community.

So, the feast of All Saints is about this general remembering of the spirit-world and these saints in heaven can intercede for us. This feast of All Saints happened way back in the fourth century. A few centuries later it was easy to introduce what we call the feast of All Souls on the next day-these are the spirits on the way to God but who needed help.

When people feel so alone today in our world, this feast of Halloween, All Saints and All Souls says one beautiful thing! We are all connected! We are never alone! In other words, everyone on earth, in

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purgatory, or in heaven are all part of one family of God. Jesus said, "I am the vine and you are the branches". So, Halloween, All Saints, All Souls say we are all connected. We form one vast communion of saints and these festive days remind us of that great Catholic truth.

We mightn't all dress up for Halloween, but we dress up to come to Mass...and even this ritually connects us to the spirit world. In other words, in dressing up, we are symbolically connected to the community of the invisible world. And that's a great thing. Also, when we put on those scary Halloween masks, try to remember, from a Christian point of view, that they are a symbol of human disfigurement brought on by sin, betrayal, sickness, and death itself. But faith reminds us that someday those masks, by the grace of God, and our faith, will be removed and we shall be made beautiful as ugliness dissolves, sin is cleansed, and even the last enemy, death falls before the everlasting mercy of Christ.

Halloween, of course, like Christmas has been co-opted by the market-place and lost much of its spiritual power. But here are four suggestions which might help your family restore spiritual power back into Halloween, All Saints and All Souls Day:

- 1. Gather your whole family and offer a prayer or story for someone in your family who has died and who are still very much present to us in the communion of saints
- 2. Bring out the family album or pictures of grandma or grandpa or other deceased members of the family, put it on a coffee table with a little candle lit in front of it.
- 3. On this All Saints Day weekend, have family members google their saint's name and tell everyone something about the saint you are named after. Take some treats of Halloween around to the residents of a local nursing home and share a little time with them. (Bausch, W. Once upon a Gospel. 23rd
