4th Sunday of Easter - Good Shepherd (Vocations) Sunday

God speaks to us in subtle ways which bring peace and certainty when we listen well. What is your name – who are you? Can you find a way to hear the sound of the genuine in yourself? (Howard Thurman, "The Sound of the Genuine.") There are so many noises and distractions going on inside of us. What do you do, or where do you go, to get still enough to find the gentle song being sung in your life by God? It requires learning to listen for and recognize over time the voice and character of God in our hearts and daily lives: "The sheep that belong to me listen to my voice." Discernment is about seeing, knowing, and being known. Do you want to be seen and known by God?

Our Christian community offers unique opportunities for spiritual formation and discernment. Together, we are called to let God become the centre of our lives, speak to us, guide us, hold us and renew the depths of our being. We have the freedom to say yes to God's call and to choose to live it in very specific ways. Our faith communities help us make and sustain that choice.

Does the Good Shepherd only call certain people? Does the Good Shepherd call me? Why would the Good Shepherd want us to hear His voice?

First, he calls us to his way of life, so that like him, we may return to the Father. Jesus put it simply: "Enter into your Master's joy." Who can imagine the joy of God which we will share in our Father's house? Are we treasuring too many things which, though they may seem important each day and each hour are as nothing compared with our eternal destiny?

Secondly, the Good Shepherd's voice comes to us under many guises and through many people. It comes through our parents and our teachers. They have embraced their call (vocation) to be the Good Shepherd's helpers and to be his voice guiding and encouraging us.

Like those called to the vocation of marriage and parenthood, when God calls men to the priesthood, and women and men to religious life by the call of the heart, we say they have a *vocation*, a calling to the work of Christ. On this Good Shepherd Sunday, let us pray that more of us may still our hearts to listen to the still small voice of God who continually calls all of us to use our gifts and choose pathways back to God's Home. Our mothers bring a unique blessing through their loving service of family and

Pope Leo XIV: 'Peace be with all of you'

Pope Leo XIV greets the faithful and the world invoking peace and pledging to work for a united Church faithful to Jesus and to the Gospel.

Pope Leo XIV greeted the city of Rome and the world

with these words at his first appearance as the Successor of Peter from the Central Loggia of St Peter's Basilica: Pope Leo XIV: Greetings to Rome and to the world Peace be with you! Dearest brothers and sisters, this was the first greeting of the risen Christ, the good shepherd who gave His life for the flock of God. I, too, would like this greeting of peace to enter your hearts, to reach your families and all people, wherever they are; and all the peoples, and all the earth: Peace be with you.

This is the peace of the Risen Christ, a disarming and humble and preserving peace. It comes from God. God, who loves all of us, without any limits or conditions. Let us keep in our ears the weak but always brave voice of Pope Francis, who blessed Rome - the Pope who blessed Rome and the world that day on

Allow me to continue that same blessing. God loves us, all of us, evil will not prevail. We are all in the hands of God. "Thrilled and in awe": The Diocese of Parramatta and Sydney's west celebrate the election of Pope Leo XIV

The Diocese of Parramatta joins the universal Church in joyful celebration of the election of Cardinal Robert Prevost OSA as the 267th successor to St Peter with the papal name Pope Leo XIV. Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv, Bishop of Parramatta, welcomed the announcement with prayerful optimism.

"This is a joyful moment for the universal Church and a deeply meaningful one for our local community in Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains."

"Pope Leo XIV brings a missionary heart, shaped by decades serving among the poor in Peru. As an Augustinian, he will gift the Church and the world with a deeply

contemplative spirit," Bishop Vincent said.
"I have met him on several occasions, as have many of the Augustinians in our Diocese who know him well. He is a humble, prayerful man, dedicated to Christ and steeped in the mystical charism of the Augustinian tradition and I pray that he will guide our church with renewed hope and joy during this challenging time," he said.

For the local Augustinian community in Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains, the announcement brings both excitement and profound personal connection. Fr David Austin OSA, Assistant Priest at Holy Spirit Parish St Clair and former Provincial of the Australian Augustinians, was "absolutely thrilled" with the news and described Pope Leo XIV not only as a spiritual leader but also "a personal friend." Rachael Kama, a member of the Diocese's Mission Enhancement Team and Asia-Pacific Lay Representative for the Augustinians, shared her surprise and joy upon hearing the news. Having met "Fr Bob" – as many still affectionately call him – at multiple international gatherings, she remembered his humility vividly. "He is a very humble man. When I was at the OSA International Lay Congress last year, he was driving people to and from the airport!" she said.

Mass Readings

First Reading

Acts 13:14,43-52

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Paul and Barnabas carried on from Perga till they reached Antioch in Pisidia. Here they went to the synagogue on the sabbath and took their seats.

When the meeting broke up, many Jews and devout converts joined Paul and Barnabas, and in their talks with them Paul and Barnabas urged them to remain faithful to the grace God has given them.

The next sabbath almost the whole town assembled to hear the word of God. When they saw the crowds, the Jews, prompted by jealousy, used blasphemies and contradicted everything Paul said. Then Paul and Barnabas spoke out boldly. 'We had to proclaim the word of God to you first, but since you have rejected it, since you do not think yourselves worthy of eternal life, we must turn to the pagans. For this is what the Lord commanded us to do when he said:

I have made you a light for the nations, so that my salvation may reach the ends of the earth.'

It made the pagans very happy to hear this and they thanked the Lord for his message; all who were destined for eternal life became believers. Thus the word of the Lord spread through the whole countryside.

But the Jews worked upon some of the devout women of the upper classes and the leading men of the city and persuaded them to turn against Paul and Barnabas and expel them from their territory. So they shook the dust from their feet in defiance and went off to Iconium; but the disciples were filled with joy and the Holy Spirit.
