Gospel Reflection -

Feast of the Holy Family First Sunday of Christmas

"Rise, take the child and his mother, flee to Egypt, and stay there until I tell you." Matthew 2: 13-15, 19-23

A family's escape to Egypt

They travel at night. She nuzzles their infant daughter against her, he carries a bag with a few necessities for the baby; their only worldly possessions are in his backpack. They are desperate to escape this place that is no longer home. Violence has shattered their lives. They are marked by their tribe, their language, their social class, their poverty.

Or they're crammed into a truck or car with far too many kms on it. His job moved somewhere else, so they're on the move to find work and maybe settle into the life every parent wants for their children.

Or the "journey" is travelled not along a rocky road but within a broken heart: trying to find one's way as a single parent after a spouse's death or divorce, taking on a world difficult enough for a couple let alone a single woman or man. The journey is a painful juggling of emotions and practicalities in the course of a night that seems will never see dawn.

What drives them along this dangerous road is hope: hope for a safe harbor to raise their children, hope for work to support themselves and their families, hope that they might reclaim their dignity as human beings.

So they run from the brutality and cruelty of "Herod," seeking to make a new life in whatever Egypt they can find.

A different place and time, but the same journey.

The Gospel of Mary and Joseph's escape to Egypt has been lived by countless families in every place and time.

This Christmas, Mary, Joseph and the Child are escaping gangs in Guatemala, running from militant terrorist groups in Syria, fleeing government police in nations throughout Africa and Asia.

The Holy Family is Christian, Jewish, Islam, and every religious and spiritual sect; the Holy Family is white, black, brown, yellow; the Holy Family speaks every tongue and dialect on earth.

At Christmas, as we celebrate the gift of our own families, Matthew's Gospel on this Feast of the Holy Family confronts us with the struggles of many families and God's call to us, as their brothers and sisters, to make a place for them where they will find safety, justice and dignity as God's own. tremendous gift of HOPE waiting to bear fruit within ourselves and we wait to recognise how we can gift Hope to othersthe hope of God's love in our world.

New vision and direction for Catholic Youth

Informed by the Diocesan Pastoral Plan, the continued listening and sharing of young people in parishes and schools and an acknowledgement of where the Holy Spirit is guiding our Church, CYP's new Mission Plan aims to form and awaken "a community of disciples among young people in Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains, where leadership is nurtured, accompaniment is intentional and encounters with the living presence of Jesus Christ are at the heart of our work and service."

CYP's outgoing manager Qwayne Guevara said the new plan had "been a fruit of the way in which we've strived to do youth ministry in the Diocese".

"It's our attempt at articulating a vision that aligns with the Pastoral Plan, but also honours our communities, the experiences of our young people and looks forward to what is going to be some significant moments of grace in our Church."

Through discussion and consultation, the CYP team has designated three mission priorities in their service to young people: leadership and formation, accompaniment and listening, and encounter and community

"It's clear that across the Diocese, when asked about what CYP is, the answer is different to different people depending on their community and their experience of youth ministry and of the Church," CYP Facilitator Sebastian Duhau said.

"These consultations have been an opportunity to enable our youth ministry leaders and young people across the Diocese to contribute to what the vision and mission of CYP is in
